mind. Rather than play church, God wanted us actively to serve people, and a store was the vehicle.


Soon the small, half-empty convenience store in an unattractive, unadorned box on a bare lot grew both physically and with many more services and products offered. My Dad and Grandpa remodeled and expanded the building and beautified the lot with trees, grass, and a hitching rail. (Ya think?) Then over the ensuing months, we added



hardware (go figure!), a small section of produce, a snack shop (forerunner of the Deli Café) that served old fashioned ice cream sodas, banana splits, sundaes, etc., and self-serve Texaco gas pumps before self-serve gasoline was invented. We didn't have wood stoves or Stihl power equipment, but we did have hay and feed, tires and a tiny car wash. At that time in 1967, food stamps were unknown, cigarettes were 25¢/pack, and gasoline was 29¢/gallon. We did have some issues with government agencies, but not very many, and so we were free to run the store for the CUSTOM-ERS, not for the bureaucrats. We could speak to employees without worrying what words we used, and guess what? There were only two genders – male and female.

After 8 years had passed, there were enough of us serving God together so that we could consider a store in a second location, which turned out to be this one in Lucerne the nanny state. Further, if we believe we should take a bold stand for God and against the increasing amount of anti-God legislation coming from Sacramento, we could end up with our names in the headlines for being bad people.

As I sat in a sexual harassment training session that is mandated by female-controlled federal and state agencies, rather than listen closely to the baloney we've had to endure multiple times before, I drew these three bar graphs to illustrate what has happened to people trying to run a business over the years.
